Lorelle R. Swader is the ALA Associate Executive Director, ALA Offices and Member Relations and ALA-Allied Professional Association. In this position, Lorelle Swader provides leadership and management for the ALA Office for Accreditation; Office for Diversity, Literacy and Outreach; Office for Human Resource Development and Recruitment; Office for Intellectual Freedom; ALA Library and Research Center; ALA Public Programs Office; ALA Member Services, including membership recruitment and retention and the ALA Member and Customer Service Center; and, coordination and liaison for ALA Round Tables. She will also continue her leadership and management of the ALA-Allied Professional Association, a separate (501)(c)(6) organization focused on the needs of library workers. Taken as a whole, this provides a strong focus on membership recruitment, development and engagement; continuing professional development; and support for ALA mission and values.



Lorelle Swader has been with the American Library Association since October 1992, when she was hired as a Program Office/Deputy Executive Director for the American Library Trustee Association (ALTA)-now United for Libraries. In 1997, she became the Director of the ALA Office for Human Resource Development and Recruitment (HRDR). Among her many accomplishments in that role, she has served as staff liaison to the Library Support Staff Interests Round Table (LSSIRT) and the 3rd Congress on Professional Education: Focus on Library Support Staff (COPE3) held in 2003. In 2011, while remaining Director of HRDR, Lorelle became the Director of the ALA-APA, where she has increased the visibility of the National Library Workers Day campaign, among other achievements.

Prior to joining ALA, Lorelle Swader held several library positions. She was Coordinator of Reference Services at the East Chicago Public Library (East Chicago, IN). Before that she held positions as Library Services Manager at the Detroit Bar Association Foundation Library (Detroit, MI) and as Law Librarian at the Marion County Law Library (Indianapolis, IN). She has also been an adjunct professor at the Graduate School of Library Science (GSLS) at Dominican University. Lorelle Swader has a B.A. in Speech Communication and an M.L.S., both from Indiana University. She also has an M.A. in Communications and Training, from Governors State University (IL). In addition, she earned her Certified Association Executive (CAE) recognition in 2004 and has since sustained that recognition, through service and continuing professional development in association management.
