# Early Childhood

### Ready to Read Michigan Kits

- ➤ A "take-home kit" for each of the 5 practices (Talk, Play, Read, Write, Sing)
  - A free book or list of diverse books from your collection that meet the practice
  - Activity/Rhymes
  - Craft
  - Storytime tool such as shakers/scarves
  - o RTRM print materials from LM
- > Have available for regular storytime participants, but also at bus stations, laundromats, diaper pantries, etc.
- > Provide QR codes for slides or links to videos with tips and encouragement for caregivers.
- > Share with local media/social media.





### Themed Book Packs

- From "Things that Go!" to "ABC's," families love discovering new titles that convey their favorite things. Build & circulate "themed book packs" to families.
- Families can skip the struggle of searching & holding specific titles by relying on your expertise to build them a pack.
- Pair packs with activities, read-a-like lists, and an optional "play" item like a puppet.
- Highlight diverse books, folk tales, animals, favorite characters, and other sections of your collection.



# Re-Charge Your 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten!

- In addition to print reading logs, give families options to email or digitally submit logs by moving program to a virtual platform such as Wandoo Reader/Beanstack.
- Shift to fewer/combined prizes so they are easier to hand out and can be given out with curbside orders. (A small prize every 100 books, like a pencil)
- Push out 1,000 Books tips and reminders on your social media, along the lines of "Tell us what book you and your little one are enjoying this week!" to try to build a sense of community among those doing the program.
- Highlight accomplishments on social media!





### Favorite Book Character Hunt

- Connect with local businesses, organizations, and neighbors to post a character from popular picture books prepare and distribute pre-printed characters combined with a rhyme or short story verse, to hang in their window.
- Challenge families to "spot" them all and collect the story.
- Return completed hunts for a prize such as a local coupon book, food bucks to the farmers' market, or a coloring kit.

### Storybook "Drive" or Reader's Theatre

- Recreate a favorite tale as a drivethrough story play! You can record & share on your platforms for those unable to drive through.
   Sample: <u>C.E. Weldon Public Library</u> (TN) Storybook Drive
- Cast & record familiar staff faces for a virtual reader's theatre or team with the Parks department for a drive-in reading.
- Pair up with a local radio station to offer stories over the air.

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### POP Projects!

- "POP Projects" are quick & easy engagement activities for families on the go.
- Includes brief explanation of craft & crafting materials in a popcorn bag.
- Themed ideas are small & low cost, to fit into bag.



- "Make Your Own Scratchoff Ticket"
  - Draw a picture, write the punchline of a joke, or let a friend know how much you care about them.
  - Cover the words or drawing with a scratch off sticker and give it to someone special!



### STEM @ Home

- Provide take-home kits or a list of commonly found materials around the house.
- Supplement with live-time or recorded videos.
- Work with local schools to supplement curriculum.

### Virtual Field Trips

- Collaborate with local museums and organizations like the zoo!
- Pre-record video or host live "walkthroughs," or share one of the many free virtual tours on websites from around the nation and world.
- Feature related books from your collection.
- Allow time for Q&A with participants.
- Make the Library a "stop" on the tour list. (more on this soon...)





### "Build a..." Challenges

- Create a challenge calendar to send home or post a regular challenge on social media.
- Mix in various materials or stick to one format such as:
  - Legos
  - Minecraft
  - Roblox
- Take it outside!
  - Mark off lawn space or use a local park to offer building challenges.





### History Hunts

- Team up with your local history librarian or a local history organization.
- Be creative in tying in local "stops" for the hunt & sharing history. Use images like historic postcards from your collection as clues!
- Use Geocaching type model or create a simple checklist.
- Create a hashtag for families to share on social media & build engagement.
- Partner/include local businesses to help boost the hunt.
- Provide QR codes or signs that expand the story at each "stop."



Get ready to put your puzzle solving skills to the test as you go back in time to solve a history mystery in downtown Grand Haven!

This challenge combines a virtual puzzle with a real world scavenger hunt. Use historic photos, maps, and other clues to find your way around your favorite modern downtown locations.




# Families/Small Groups

### Choose Your Own Adventure!

- The Choose Your Own Adventure should be written in small enough segments to keep the attention of the participants.
- A general storyline can be created, but there can be as many as a dozen endings to the story and two dozen ways to get to that ending!
- Create a family club for submitting/sharing their adventure segments!
- Multi-Library project? To alleviate the burden we could have libraries write different portions of the story. <u>Sample Chart</u> from Read Write Think
- Format can be tricky, but Google Forms can be <u>manipulated to</u> create a storyline.

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### Nutritional & Personal Needs

- Replace Little Free Libraries with...
  - Personal Needs Pantries
  - Food Pantries
- Partner with community gardens for your seed libraries & programming. Offer "tastes from the garden" for families.
- Pair "cooking" videos with Ingredient Kits
- Invest in a <u>mobile kitchen</u> or circulate "kitchen kits" with special tools add ingredients for specific recipes.
- Partner with organizations such as <u>Helping</u>
   <u>Women Period</u> to offer personal supplies.
- Contact WIC for local support & information.



## Physical Challenges

- <u>Challenge families to invent a sport</u> they do at home, share (maybe even swap?) rules with the library, who shares out all the resulting games for kids to play at home
- Create Motion Cards
- Provide "Silly Walk" Signs
- Nature walks or scavenger hunts
- Sidewalk chalk paths/mazes... block off part of your parking lot for this use or challenge families to submit videos!
- Create a 5 Senses Walk.
- Offer Yard Games\* (rsvp for library lawn use or as a "Library of Things" check-out option) \*Cleaning
- Disc Golf! BYOF: Bring Your Own Frisbee & no-touch by not finishing in the basket.







## Family/Group Challenges & Kits

- "Make what you will of it!" craft supplies from your closets w/inspiration prompts. Bonus: your closet of leftovers gets cleaned out/up!
- List of random items in the house for creating art.
- Building on the "make what you will of it," <u>check</u> <u>out the UMSI design thinking game cards as</u> <u>potential prompts</u>.
- Collaborative/community art projects, such as clean-up or painting projects.
- <u>Geocaching</u> Starter Kit with local trail maps, toy binoculars, compass, etc.







# Teacher/At-Home Educator Engagement

### Parent Resource Center

- Create a section to highlight Parenting/Education materials.
- Policies consider extending any privileges made for public and private school teachers to homeschoolers/families/day cares.
- Information files
  - Create handouts of the state laws and regulations
  - Start a "things to do in our town" file
  - Offer collection bundles
  - "How to use the library catalog" videos
  - Database training

## Virtual Library Visits

- Design for small groups or larger ones.
- Video Tours (Children's/Teen Rooms, Circulation/Pick-up process, Book drop "behind the scenes")
- Library orientation (covering what is different, resources, website, library card info, etc.)
- Share upcoming programs
- Q&A teacher facilitated (make cohost so they can unmute kids)





### Communication

- Weekly digital newsletter highlighting resources to local educators:
  - Providing the "Why"
  - Don't just send a link -- Curate what you have access to instead of just pointing people to a resource.
- At-Home Educator "Intro" to Library Resources
- Connect directly with school literacy specialists
- Guides to Educational Jargon know your district's curriculum!
  - Resilient Educator
  - Teacher Vision
