 - ✓ Educational -10.7%







Signature

You'll Need:

...to have good idea that addresses a community need

...to find the right place to ask

...to put together a superior proposal

Can I / Should I Apply?

- ► Eligible?
 - ► Government agencies? 501(c)(3)
 - Geographic restrictions
 - Grantor checklist
- Will the budget terms work for our project?

- Do project goals align with the funder's mission?
- ▶ Do I have the time?
 - ▶ What are the odds?
 - ► Can I put my best foot forward?
 - Can I complete the project?


Do Your Homework

- Research funder's grant history
- Have ideas ready to go should opportunity arise
- Make sure you get appropriate library support
- Gather stats/data you need for compelling narrative



Who Benefits / How

- Focus on people's needs not libraries
- Not about the need but the impact



Create a Work Plan

- Do this first even if it doesn't come until later in the application
- Be conscious as to what happens prior/during/following the grant period
- ▶ Be realistic with your timeline
- Break down into further deadlines for your own use



The Application

Executive Summary (Abstract)

- First thing they'll read; last thing you should write
- ► Elevator speech
 - ▶ Who you'll help, how you'll do it
- Use the funders own wording



Narrative

- About Your Organization
 - Qualifications
 - ▶ Who do you serve?
 - ► Long-range plan as related to project
- Needs statement
- Goals and Objectives
 - ▶ Who's going to benefit and how?
 - Measurable

- Project Description Activities
 - Outlines activities, personnel
 - ▶ Who, What, When, Where, Why, How
- Activities / Timeline*
 - Project flow (closely tied to activities)
- Evaluation*

Budget

- ▶ What's the overall cost?
- ► In-Kind/Match?
- Any other contributions?
- ► Are all expenses eligible?
- ► Incidentals?
- ► Supports the project?



Evaluation

- Outcome Based Planning and Evaluation – OBPE
 - Shaping Outcomes: www.shapingoutcomes.org

- Mix of quantitative, qualitative
 - Outputs Quantitative, Numbers
 - Programs, attendees, circulations, surveys
 - Outcomes Qualitative
 - ▶ Impact, Behavior
- Think of how you're going to get the answer

Tips

Before / During

- Avoid jargon
- Ask someone not familiar with project to review the application
- Keeping funders mission, project description in mind
- Tailor application to grant; there's no one size fits all
- Read all directions
- Don't be afraid to reach out to grant contact

After (Apply, Apply Again)

- ▶ Don't be discouraged.
- Solicit feedback
- Reapply if appropriate
- Serve on review committees
