
Science of Reading

- Body of scientific research into how kids learn to read and how best to teach them to read and write
 - Multiple fields of research: cognitive psychology, education, linguistics, neuroscience, communication sciences, and developmental psychology to name a few.
 - Lack of connection between education schools and researchers
- Not static, so things will continue to change
- More than just phonics
- Not a specific curriculum, ideology, or philosophy



Sing with me!


Staff-created list

Beginning Reader Collection

Leveled Readers

- Popular characters
- Build print concepts, story comprehension, vocabulary, and oral language development
- Primary focus is meaning
- Popular part of balanced literacy classrooms

Decodable Readers

- Allow kids to practice specific phonics skills learned
- Great for very beginning readers and as new phonics skills are introduced
- Primary focus is accuracy

DECODABLE VS LEVELED TEXT

Decodable readers provide children with a controlled text that follows a predictable pattern and helps them practice reading more frequently, which will make it easier for them to gain fluency.


Leveled readers allow children to read texts that are more difficult or longer than what they would typically read in a decodable book, while still providing practice with decoding skills through reading strategies such as predicting or summarizing

Which one should you use? BOTH!

They serve different purposes but are both great when used correctly along with high quality phonics instruction.





Choosing Decodables for your collection

- Text makes sense and is engaging
- Contain natural language and syntax
- Words part of children's vocabularies
- Contain high-frequency words (ex. The)
- Repeat words throughout





 - Module 4: The Continents




